FESTIVAL CO-CHAIRS

Owsley Brown III is devoted to sustaining healthy communities by enhancing cultural, spiritual and civic life. He is a documentary filmmaker, a director of foundations and nonprofit boards, a student of theology and the spiritual path, and the leader of exploratory projects in community wellbeing. In his native city and beloved hometown of Louisville, Owsley is known as host and producer of the Festival of Faiths, a founding board member of the Kentucky College of Art + Design, and chair of the Compassionate Schools Project. Owsley is also an active fifth-generation



shareholder of Brown-Forman, his family's international spirits and wine company, founded in 1870. He serves on the boards of the Center for Interfaith Relations, University of Virginia's Contemplative Sciences Center, Mind and Life Institute, Sustainable Food Alliance, Roxie Theater, and Tsoknyi Humanitarian Fund.



Adria Johnson is president and CEO of Metro United Way (MUW), a nonprofit that unites and empowers communities by investing in the full potential of individuals and families to ensure positive, sustainable change. Adria was selected for the position following an extensive national search, and in 2021, she became the first Black CEO of the agency, which serves seven counties in Kentucky and Southern Indiana. The native Louisvillian is an accomplished champion of social change with a longstanding dedication to community impact and equity. Previous positions include chief impact

officer at MUW, commissioner at the Department for Community Based Services for Kentucky State Government, and assistant director at the Department of Housing and Family Services for Louisville Metro Government. Adria's strong fiscal experience was gained in various roles held in the private sector for the first half of her career at Humana, LG&E and Brown & Williamson.





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GERARDO ABBOUD

Gerardo Abboud was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where he was educated as an engineer and worked as a financial analyst at Ford before making a dramatic life change. In 1970, he traveled to India and Nepal to study Tibetan Buddhism. Gerardo has translated from Tibetan to English and Spanish for many lamas, specifically serving as main translator to His Holiness Dalai Lama since 1992 during his visits to Latin America. He is the head and resident teacher of the Dongyuling Tibetan Buddhist Center in Argentina, alternating with his teachings in Mexico, the U.S., Canada and Europe.



KARINA BARILLAS

Karina Barillas, a native of Guatemala, won a Fulbright scholarship that led her to the University of Louisville, where she earned degrees in education with a concentration in counseling psychology. She began working on women's issues as president of UofL's International Students Organization, then spent eight years advocating for Latina survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault at the Center for Women and Families. She co-founded and works as executive director for La Casita Center, a nonprofit that enhances the well-being of Louisville's Latino community.



PAUL BRANDEIS RAUSHENBUSH

The Rev. Paul Brandeis Raushenbush is a Baptist minister and CEO of Interfaith Alliance, where he works to forge alliances among people of diverse beliefs to build an inclusive multi-faith democracy. Paul speaks regularly at colleges, faith communities and institutes around the country and is a regular commentator on issues of religion, civil rights and social justice. He's published two books and hosts the weekly podcast "The State of Belief," in partnership with Religion News Service. Paul is the great-grandson of Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis and theologian Rev. Walter Rauschenbusch.



SHARON BROUS

Rabbi Sharon Brous is the senior and founding rabbi of IKAR, a leading-edge Jewish community based in Los Angeles, and author of the national bestseller "The Amen Effect: Ancient Wisdom to Mend Our Broken Hearts and World." She offered the invocation at the Democratic National Convention in 2024 and has blessed Presidents Obama and Biden and Vice President Harris. The "New York Times," "Los Angeles Times" and "Washington Post" have published her work, and more than 1.5 million people have viewed her TED Talk "Reclaiming Religion."



TRICIA HERSEY

Tricia Hersey's upbringing as the daughter of an abolitionist pastor influences her art. A native of the South Side of Chicago, and the torchbearer of her family's Mississippi and Louisiana roots, Tricia weaves her past throughout her experiences as a teaching artist, chaplain, poet, performance artist and community organizer. Her practice embodies somatics, womanism, womanist theology, Black Liberation Theology, Afrofuturism and her ancestors. From these reservoirs of knowledge, Tricia founded The Nap Ministry and created the "rest is resistance" and "rest as reparations" frameworks.



ADAM KANE

Adam Kane began exploring Buddhism after graduating from Duke with a degree in neuroscience in 2000. He first studied in the Theravada lineage, then took the Anagarika ordination in the Thai Forest Tradition. After two years in a forest monastery, he began practicing Tibetan Buddhism and moved to Nepal to study Tibetan language and Buddhist philosophy. He stayed there for seven years, gaining a master of arts in Buddhist studies from Rangjung Yeshe Institute. Adam mentors translator trainees from Khyentse Vision Project and interprets, translates and develops curriculum for his root lamas and various other lamas and khenpos.



VALARIE KAUR

Valarie Kaur is a civil rights leader, lawyer, documentarian, faith leader, mother and founder of the Revolutionary Love Project. She became an activist when a Sikh-American father, Balbir Singh Sodhi, was murdered in hate in the aftermath of 9/11. She tells untold stories — at the sites of mass shootings, inside America's prisons, at detention camps — and has won policy changes on issues ranging from hate crimes to solitary confinement. A popular address she gave, now seen by more than 40 million people, asks: "The future is dark: Is this the darkness of the tomb — or the darkness of the womb?"



JUSTIN KLASSEN

Justin Klassen is a professor of theology and religious studies at Bellarmine University, where he teaches courses in philosophical theology and religious ethics. His scholarly work focuses on religion and ecology, theological responses to systemic injustice, and the role of awe in moral formation and the quest for a meaningful life. Along with numerous scholarly and popular essays, he is the author of "The Paradox of Hope" and co-editor of "Aspiring to Fullness in a Secular Age." He and his family are Canadians now living in Kentucky.



NIMA KULKARNI

Nima Kulkarni is an immigration lawyer and a Democratic member of the Kentucky House of Representatives representing District 40. She is the founder of Indus Law Firm and a member of both the Kentucky and Georgia Bar Associations, as well as the American Immigration Lawyers Association. Nima is the first Indian American to be elected as state representative in Kentucky and has served since 2019.



M. SHADEE MALAKLOU

M. Shadee Malaklou (she/they) founded the bell hooks center at Berea College and chairs the Department of Women's, Gender and Sexuality Studies. A critical, trans-disciplinary scholar of race/ism, gender and sexuality (and their intersections), Shadee approaches questions of identity and difference from a problem-oriented perspective, wanting to make sense of our world in real time. She publishes in academic journals, appears on culture podcasts and regularly writes think pieces on such topics as Beyoncé and Jay-Z, the sports-media complex, women's freedom movements and animal rights.



JOI MCATEE

Joi McAtee's mission to build a better, fairer world shines through her leadership in education, nonprofit innovation and public service. A proud graduate of Central High School, Joi earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky and a master's in higher education administration from the University of Louisville, and she's now pursuing a master's in public administration and PhD in urban studies and public affairs. Joi is project manager for the Ali Compassion Index at the Muhammad Ali Center. Previously, she served as executive director of equity for Louisville Metro Government.



BRANDON MCCORMACK

Dr. Michael Brandon McCormack is associate professor of Pan-African Studies and Comparative Humanities at the University of Louisville, where he teaches courses in African American religion, religions of the African diaspora, and religion and hip-hop culture. He is the former director of the Anne Braden Institute for Social Justice Research and is also a member of the Black Interfaith Project, a network of academics, artists and activists engaged in research and action about the role of Black religious practices in social justice movements.



EVELIO Menjivar-ayala

Bishop Evelio Menjivar-Ayala was born in El Salvador and migrated to the United States in 1990. He studied in Miami and Rome before being ordained to the priesthood in 2004. His work has included serving as parochial vicar and pastor at numerous churches and as a member of the Archdiocesan Child Protection Advisory Board. He speaks English, Spanish and Italian and, throughout his ministry, has actively supported workers and promoted social justice for immigrants. In 2023, he became the first Salvadoran bishop in the country, serving for the Archdiocese of Washington in D.C.



JOSH MOSS

Josh Moss has served as editor of Louisville Magazine since 2014, and he began working at the publication upon graduating from Ohio University in 2006. He's written about Pappy Van Winkle mania, the city's oldest Black-owned funeral home, Louisville's last abortion clinic, the divide between east and west Louisville, and how the city has changed since March 2020. He spent a year working on a profile of rapper Jack Harlow. In 2013, he ate 38 burgers in 31 days on a quest to find the city's best. In 2020, the magazine won a General Excellence award from the City and Regional Magazine Association.



MINJUNG NOH

Dr. Minjung Noh, assistant professor of religion at Lehigh University, explores global Christianity, colonialism and transnational networks of care. Her current book project, "Transnational Salvations: Korean Evangelical Missionaries in Haiti," examines how mission and disaster are entangled in histories of empire and resilience. She also writes about visual pop culture and visual anthropology, how images and media shape faith, and belonging and imagination across borders. Minjung speaks on how traditions both confront and reproduce inequality, and how communities create belonging in times of crisis.



JANAN SARWAR

Janan Sarwar, an entrepreneur and speaker based in Louisville, fosters a combination of expertise in pharmacy, publishing and media, coupled with a commitment to promoting understanding and compassion. Her journey exemplifies the power of merging professional pursuits with a genuine passion for cultivating positive change in the world.



SIMRAN JEET SINGH

Dr. Simran Jeet Singh, a historian of South Asian religions, is assistant professor of interreligious histories at Union Theological Seminary in New York and author of the national bestseller "The Light We Give: How Sikh Wisdom Can Transform Your Life." He is senior advisor for the Aspen Institute's Religion and Society Program, host of the podcast "Wisdom and Practice," a contributor to "TIME" and an Atlantic Fellow for Racial Equity with the Nelson Mandela Foundation and Columbia University. He has authored multiple children's books, including the recent "A Vaisakhi to Remember."



AYMAN SOLIMAN

Imam Ayman Soliman, a Muslim chaplain in the Cincinnati area (including at Cincinnati Children's Hospital), received his Islamic education, both formal and informal, in Egypt. Before focusing on chaplaincy, he served as the imam in multiple mosques, and as the graduate students' Muslim chaplain at Northwestern University and the Muslim chaplain at the Oregon Department of Corrections. Ayman is a member of the board of directors at the Initiative on Islam and Medicine. His areas of interest include Islamic law, Islamic biomedical ethics, interfaith relations and addressing Islamophobia.



CHELSEA STEINAUER-SCUDDER

Chelsea Steinauer-Scudder is the author of "Mother, Creature, Kin: What We Learn From Nature's Mothers in a Time of Unraveling." She grew up in the Great Plains of Nebraska and Oklahoma and, after receiving a master's in theological studies at Harvard Divinity School, began focusing her writing on the confluence of relationship to place with experiences of the sacred. Chelsea previously worked as a staff writer and editor for Emergence Magazine, an online and print publication exploring the intersection of culture, ecology and spirituality.



JOSEPH TUCKER EDMONDS

Joseph L. Tucker Edmonds is an associate professor of Africana studies and religious studies at Indiana University Indianapolis. His research addresses the intersection between Black religion and the body, with a particular focus on agency, care and wellness. His team was recently awarded a \$5-million grant from the Mellon Foundation to explore "Black Humanities in the Midwest" with collaborative, community-embedded research labs throughout Indiana. Joseph also explores the afterlives of incarceration through an examination of Black men, racial trauma and creating communities of care.



TOKO-PA TURNER

Toko-pa Turner is Ashkenazi Jewish and Polish on her mother's side, and British on her father's side. She was born on a farm in England and, at age 4, immigrated to Montreal, where her maternal grandparents settled after surviving the Holocaust. She grew up in a Sufi kahnqah (spiritual community) in the Ināyati Order. Toko-pa says her home life was volatile, and she ran away at age 14. Toko-pa eventually returned to the mystical teachings of Sufism and the study of dreams, and in 2001, she founded the Dream School. In 2018, she released the award-winning book "Belonging."



MATT WEBER

Matt Weber is a Harvard-educated humorist and the author of "Fearing the Stigmata" and the Christopher Award-winning "Operating on Faith." He is a national speaker, producer, writer and former host of the weekly CatholicTV show "The Lens," a humorous recap of digital trends, culture and news in the faith community. His work has been featured in "The New York Times" and on CBS News, which referred to him as "the voice of a new generation of Catholics." Matt plays the harmonica and has three small children—all in various stages of harmonica playing.



NORMAN WIRZBA

Norman Wirzba is the Gilbert T. Rowe Distinguished Professor of Theology and the director of research in the Office of Climate and Sustainability at Duke. He writes and teaches at the intersections of theology, philosophy, and agrarian and environmental studies. His most recent books include "Love's Braided Dance: Hope in a Time of Crisis"; "Agrarian Spirit: Cultivating Faith, Community, and the Land"; and "This Sacred Life: Humanity's Place in a Wounded World."



The Rev. Elmer Zavala is the pastor at Preston Highway Hispanic Presbyterian Ministries in Louisville. Originally from Honduras, he became a minister to support those in need in the immigrant community. Elmer also co-founded La Minga, a community farm in Prospect, Kentucky. His interpreter and son, Galen Zavala Sherby, will join him at the festival.

ELMER ZAVALA

Appalatin's foot-stomping sounds unite Appalachian folk and high-energy Latin music blending traditional guitar, mandolin, upright bass, charango, indigenous Andean flutes, hand percussion, harmonica and vocal harmonies. Their name reflects the unexpected meeting of Kentucky-raised musicians and Latin émigrés from Ecuador,



Nicaragua and Guatemala. After starting out playing at a local coffee shop for free coffee in 2006, the band has since performed at some of the region's most prestigious venues and has shared the stage with musicians ranging from Sam Bush to Ben Sollee.



Qais Essar is an acclaimed Afghan-American composer, instrumentalist and producer. Renowned for his mastery of the rabab — a 2,500-year-old string instrument — Qais bridges ancient and modern sounds by blending traditional Afghan and Indian classical music with contemporary genres. Qais has toured internationally, contributed original music

to feature films and TV and was a featured artist with the Oxford Philharmonic.

Rus Funk is coordinator for the Kentucky Unitarian Universalist Justice Action Network and a consultant, activist and trainer. He helps create systems-level transformation that supports men and boys in ways that advance gender, sexual and racial equity and justice. He has more than 30 years of experience in mobilizing men to end gender-based violence, providing therapeutic and other support services. Rus is co-founder of Men Can Stop Rape Inc., the Own It Initiative (a Center for Women and Families project), White Folks Against Racism, the People's Coalition for Justice and other groups.

Susan Patrice is a photographer who has collaborated with hundreds of professional and citizen artists to create transformative cultural experiences. Sara holds degrees in violin performance and has attended several international programs, including at the Berlin University of the Arts. She co-curated SONICBernheim, a performance series that explores the relationships between sound, music and nature, and has recorded with musicians such as Will Oldham.



SHYAMA IYER

Shyama Iyer is an emerging Indian-American writer, composer and choreographer who works most often in live theater settings, where she blends Bharatanatyam, contemporary dance, Carnatic and American musical theater music, and the aesthetics of classical Indian poetry and drama. Her recent musical theater work, which reimagines Indian myths, includes writing the book, music and lyrics for "The Sound of an Anklet" and "A Game of Dice". She also co-directs the Guru Vandana Arts Academy and the Geeva Arts Festival in Louisville.



FRED NEZ-KEAMS

Fred Nez-Keams, who now resides in Kentucky, is a Diné flute-maker and musician from the Navajo Nation in New Mexico. Raised in Navajo traditions by his grandparents, a Medicine Man and a Hand Trembler, Fred shares his ministry through his music and stories. The Kentucky Arts Council has featured his work in a "Native Reflection" exhibit and commissioned his work for the 2022 Governor's Awards in the Arts.



JACKIE ROYCE

Jackie Royce is a bassoonist who earned her degree in instrumental performance from the University of Louisville. She plays with several orchestras in the region, including the Louisville Orchestra, and has played internationally in Poland, Costa Rica and Switzerland. Jackie is a member of the art-rock band Ut Gret and collaborates with various experimental and rock groups. For more than 15 years she has been a music teacher, including offering improvisation workshops and coaching the Beginner Group with the Louisville Leopard Percussionists.



BEN SOLLEE

Ben Sollee, a Kentucky musician and composer, has been blurring boundaries with his musical style for two decades, and his latest album, "Long Haul" (2024), is no exception. After his last album in 2017, Ben took a break from touring to grow his family and deepen community connections in Louisville. Now a father of three, he's leaned into work as a composer, scoring films such as "LAND" from director Robin Wright, and "Maggie Morre(s)," a film featuring Tina Fey and Jon Hamm. Ben also helped launch the nonprofit Canopy, which supports Kentucky businesses positively impacting their communities.

LOUISVILLE PRESBYTERIAN THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

In Light Through Us, guests are invited to reflect on experiences with belonging in their communities with this meditative, collaborative art exhibit. Participants will have an opportunity to create their own stained glass windows, inspired by those at LPTS's Caldwell Chapel, which will be placed on a backlit frame to create a growing Window of Belonging through the festival.

MUHAMMAD ALI CENTER

The Muhammad Ali Center invites guests to step into the ring. Not to fight, but to connect, through a display that reflects both Muhammad's legacy as the greatest boxer of all time and his radical compassion. The ring embodies the festival's theme of Sacred Belonging, the profound truth that we are all part of something greater than ourselves.

Each rope of a three-sided ring will be labeled with one of the values from the Muhammad Ali Compassion Pledge: courage, action and justice. Guests will have the opportunity to add their own act of compassion to the ring, as well as sign the pledge. This act serves as a reminder that while we may have different stories and experiences, we are all connected.

Through examples of Muhammad's acts of service, shared through the lens of the Muhammad Ali Index, guests will explore how he led with respect for all, grounded in a deep belief in our shared humanity and in the conviction that "Service to others is the rent you pay for your room here on earth."

ENTANGLEMENTS

Entanglements is a multimedia and multi-sensory exhibit that explores the shifting edges of the climate crisis as both sites of grief and loss, as well as fertile spaces of imagination and interconnection. The exhibit invites the community to engage in practices of co-creation and of envisioning possibilities.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE



ALAYNA ALTMAN

Alayna Altman is a Jewish interfaith artist exploring the connections between memory and identity. She works in oil paint and written word to create narrative-based pieces rooted in her own genealogy and culture. Her work moves between abstraction and portraiture, blending personal stories with imagined forms. Through color and text, she explores how memory can shift, fade, and reappear in new ways. Each piece becomes a way to understand where she comes from and what it means to belong.

Whimsical sculptures from beloved local artist Marvin Finn mirror the festival's spirit: that holiness can be found in the simple and familiar, and that beauty blooms where we are rooted. Together, these elements create a living environment that invites participants to pause, connect and remember that we each belong...to each other, to the earth and to the great web of life.
